

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
The **Journal on Ethnopolitics and Minority Issues in Europe (JEMIE)** is a peer-reviewed electronic journal edited under the auspices of the **European Centre for Minority Issues (ECMI)**. **JEMIE** is a multi-disciplinary journal which addresses minority issues across a broad range of studies, such as ethnopolitics, democratisation, conflict management, good governance, participation and minority rights. It is devoted to comparative analyses of current developments in minority-majority relations in the Wider Europe.

The **Journal on Ethnopolitics and Minority Issues in Europe** seeks to publish critical analyses of policies and developments in European institutions and EU Member States, their relations with the countries of the EU neighbourhood, as well as contributions on non-European perspectives on ethnopolitics in the Wider Europe and on minority issues in Europe in a global context. # JEMIE

## Types of contributions

The **Journal on Ethnopolitics and Minority Issues in Europe (JEMIE)** welcomes **research articles** from practitioners academics and students on all aspects of ethnopolitical and minority issues, including, but not restricted to:

- Theoretical and methodological approaches to the study of minority issues in Europe
- Comparative and in-depth case studies of minority groups and regions, from all regions in Europe and from Europe's neighbourhood
- Governance, political participation and civic activism in post-communist states, but also in other regions
- Conflict prevention and resolution, crisis management and security in Europe, especially with a focus on minority populated regions
- Autonomy and separatist movements involving minority groups
- European and other international organisations' approaches to address discrimination, minority protection and to develop legislation

Research articles should be between 5,000 and 10,000 words, including references. Each article should be accompanied by a short abstract (100-200 words) and a note on the author's affiliation, address and contact details. All articles published in **JEMIE** must be original and exclusive. The articles should be sent by email attachment to **[jemie@ecmi.de](mailto:jemie@ecmi.de)**

While some articles can be commissioned, unsolicited articles are highly welcome and potential authors are encouraged to contact the Journal Editor. All unsolicited journal articles undergo a peer review process, based on initial editor screening and double-blind refereeing by a minimum of two anonymous referees. Occasional articles and special issues are evaluated by the journal's editors, guest editors and at least one independent referee.

Besides original research articles, we also welcome **book reviews** of recently published books related to themes relevant for minority issues, ethnopolitics or other similar themes. These papers should be no longer than 5,000 words.

A third type of contribution that we are open to are **commentaries**, which could address one of the following:

- Comments and analyses of current events in the EU Member States and the countries in the European neighbourhood
- Review essays on contemporary legal developments, politics and policies in the Wider Europe
- Expert comments on political process and social events, reports of recent and upcoming elections; documents circulated in politics, academia and civil society relevant to minority groups and ethnopolitics
